TUSKEGEE AIRMEN



The Tuskegee Airmen is the popular name of a group of African American pilots who fought in World War II. The group was commanded by Colonel Benjamin O. Davis, Jr., who later became the first three-star general in the Air Corps. The Tuskegee Airmen flew more than 700 missions and never lost a bomber to enemy aircraft. They earned more than 744 Air Medals and Clusters, more than 100 Flying Crosses, 14 Bronze Stars, 8 Purple Hearts, a Silver Star and a Legion of Merit.
